1.0 CURRENT SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The CSR committee held a special meeting to discuss changes in CSR budget and its implications. The CSR manager presented a proposed a framework (Attached separately) for CSR activities and implementation in the coming year.

2.0 UPDATE ON CSR IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

Progress on implementation of CSR activities has been good, with coordination from the CSR committee. CSR committee meetings continued, focusing on community relations enhancement projects and implementation. A framework for CSR activities was developed and adopted by the CSR committee.

3.0 COMMUNITY RELATIONS

We continued to align all our community projects and activities to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) demonstrating our commitment to care for our community and remaining relevant. Focus areas that have recorded good progress through CSR are SDGs 3 (Improved Health and well-being), 4 (Quality Education), 5 (Gender Equality), 6 (Water and Sanitation), 13 (Climate Action) and 17 (Partnerships for the Goals)

Community projects implemented so far have made a positive impact to the communities leading to appreciation and good relations between the company and our neighbours. Descriptions of projects approved and implemented during the 4th quarter and year are outlined in the report below.

3.1 EDUCATION

Intervention

To promote lifelong learning opportunities for all, as per the SDG 4 – Quality Education, the CSR Committee approved provision of classroom furniture to identified primary and secondary schools.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, 40 Primary school desks were approved, made and handed over to 2 Primary schools.

During the year, 13 schools - 11 primary schools and 2 secondary schools received 220 desks and 40 lockers and chairs respectively, adding to 260 classroom furniture made and supplied to the schools.

Impact

As a result, 480 learners – (440 primary school pupils and 40 secondary school students) were reached with classroom furniture facilitating a conducive learning environment, enabling them to sit comfortably and participate actively in class.

3.2 ICT IN LEARNING AND YOUTH LED COMMUNITY INSTITUTIONS

Intervention

We continue to abide by our commitment to narrow the digital gap in the community.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter and year, 21 computers were availed by IT team for donation to 2 learning institutions, 1 religious institution and 1 sports association.

Impact

As a result, EPK continues to change the education landscape through equipping schools with computer labs, transforming classrooms into information-rich learning spaces, done through virtual lessons and facilitating access to online resources. Youth led community institutions have benefitted through the computers donations that have helped them streamline and make efficient the management of their organisations.

3.3 WATER (RAIN WATER HARVESTING SYSTEMS AND WIER REPAIR AND PIPING)

Intervention

To enable access to water, the CSR Committee approved installation of Rain Water Harvesting Systems in schools and wier construction, repairs and piping in the community.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, purchase and installation of a 10,000litre water tank to Taboiyat Secondary School was done.

In the year, 9 schools - 5 primary schools and 4 secondary schools had Rain Water Harvesting Kits installed. A kit comprises of 2 tanks of 5000ltr capacity, 2 constructed plinths or bases for the tanks, guttering (including fascia boards installation where missing) and constructed hand washing points.

Sile B community in Kibabet serving an estimated 57 Households benefitted from weir construction, that has enabled them access water. This project is however yet to be handed over officially to the community.

Impact

As a result, sustainable supply of an average capacity of 90,000ltrs of water is available in the schools. This saves the learners time they would use to go fetch water to engaging in academic and co-curricular activities. Access to supply of water has also facilitated cleaning of classrooms, cooking and importantly laboratory use. In the area of Environmental conservation, erosion from splashing water from the roofs along the classrooms has also been averted, ensuring soundness of classroom infrastructure is maintained.

Community-estate conflict on access to resources in Kibabet has also been resolved, with engagement by local administration and the community in conservation of the water sources around Kibabet Estate.

3.4 SANITATION

Intervention

To enhance sanitation and access to sanitation facilities within our communities, we continued to put up latrines in schools and community facilities.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, the committee approved construction of a 4 – door sanitation facility at Savani Secondary school.

In the year, 8 sanitation facilities were constructed and handed over to the communities. Out of the 8 facilities, 4 were 4 door (3 latrines and a urinal) and 4 were double door latrines.

Impact

As a result, access to sanitation facilities in the schools and communities have reduced public health hazards associated with a lack of the facilities. Service delivery in the dispensaries and markets that benefited has also improved.

Intervention

Our strategy on workplace health interventions and community health interventions have been diverse/varied. During this reporting period, we looked at workplace health interventions whose objective was to improve mental, physical and social health as well as increase awareness whilst in the community, the objective was to improve service delivery through supply of equipment.

Outcomes

We donated 3 wheelchairs to facilitate mobility of patients from one service department to another at Nandi Hills Sub-County Hospital. We also donated 200 branded T-shirts during the marking of the International Day for People with Disability that was held in partnership with stakeholders in health sector.

Within the company, we organised and carried out Mental Health Promotions activities. This was climaxed with a 15 Kilometre walk and a medical camp in collaboration with Eldoret Hospital, Kericho Annexe. The event attracted 187(106M, 82F) participants. The medical camp reached 85(26M,56F) with various health services including Blood Pressure checks, Screening for Diabetes and Cervical Cancer Screening. All 208 participants were reached with information on Mental Health Management conducted by Dr. Linda from Eldoret Hospital.

Impact

As a result of the interventions there is improved mobility of patients and waiting time for health services has been reduced.

The Mental Health Promotion activities improved greatly from the 2021 event with the additional Medical Camp. As a result, it was declared an annual event. A majority of the participants got understanding of mental health management and awareness. The event brought all cadres of employees together thus helped in building a team that is cohesive and supportive of each other.

3.6 LIGHTNING ARRESTORS

Intervention

To address safety from lightning strikes in the community, we continued to fabricate and install lightning arrestors in schools and community areas that are prone to lightning strikes.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, 4 lightning arrestors were fabricated and installed at 2 community churches and 1 secondary school.

In the year, 6 institutions had lightning arrestors installed at their compounds. These were 3 Primary schools, 1 secondary school and 2 churches.

Impact

As a result, the safety of over 2000 learning and church communities including neighbouring homesteads are now assured of safety during lightning strike risk seasons.

3.6 LOCAL ADMINISTRATION - OFFICE FURNITURE

Intervention

We continue to seek ways to strengthen local administative systems and linkages in order to improving community service delivery for our smallholder tea farmers and community. To do this we have made and donated office furniture to Local Administration Offices within our catchment areas.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, a set of office furniture (2 tables and 4 chairs) was made and donated to the Office of the Assistant County Commissioner (ACC). During the year, 6 sets of office furniture were made and donated to 5 Chief's Offices and 1 ACC's Office.



Impact

As a result, 6 local administration offices have been equipped resulting to improved community service delivery.

3.7 SPORTS

Intervention

Physical and social health enhances positve impact in terms of social welfare and local community engagement. For this reason, we have continued to support schools and communities with sports infrastructure and resources.

Outcomes

In the 4th Quarter, we installed 2 sets of Field football goal posts and volley ball posts as well as nets at Kaboi Primary School and Kiptulus Secondary schools respectively.

During the year we donated 6 volley balls, 36 footballs and 9 trophies to community sporting groups. Volley ball poles and nets were installed in 2 schools and 1 community ground.

Impact

These facilities are not only beneficial to the school community in terms of physical exercise, health and recreation, but are also beneficial to local teams that use the grounds for their home match tournaments.

3.8 SUPPORTING DIVERSIFICATION

Intervention

We collaboarte with our smallholder tea farmers to diversify their agricultural activities/sources of income for sustainable food security and production

Outcomes

During the year we repaired Lelwak Cattle dip and partnered with the Member of County Assembly to supply 50 smallholder farmers with pesticides.

Impact

The cattle dip has revived a tradition of taking the cattle to the dip e on weekends; a cultural activity that made fathers, sons and grandparents' bond. Importantly, the health of cattle in the community is now secured.

3.9 TIMBER DONATIONS

Intervention

To improve social health in communities, we have donated timber to local religious institions for construction.

Outcomes

During the year donated 8800 running ft roofing timber to 3 community churches.

Impact

These support enables community members to have a conducive environment for their religious activities and in return improved social health in communities.

Intervention

We partnered with EATTA and Cheptabach Secondary School to construct a school kitchen. Previously the school would use the primary section kitchen to prepare lunch for the students. The kitchen was congested and demand for use was high as every kitchen staff wanted to be on time with supply for food to the pupils and students. The school availed the energy saving Jiko whilst EPK, through Siret Tea company managed the resources by EATTA and Siret to draw the design and contract out labour for construction.

Outcomes

A complete kitchen facility was put up with 3 energy efficient jikos, a pantry and a dishwashing/hand washing area. The kitchen makes food for 378 students together with teachers and school support staff.

Impact

There is improved cost-effectiveness and cooking efficiency at the school since we constructed and equipped the kitchen. The Kitchen staff have a conducive working environment that is smoke free. The amount of firewood is also reduced as the cook stoves are energy efficient designed.

Intervention

We partnered with Tumoi Teas and supported the hunger stricken community in Northen Kenya with dry food stuff (Grains)

Outcomes

We purchased 33-90kg bags of maize and flagged off to communities in Bura.

Impact

Maize was delivered to 30 households that would last the families 4 – 8 weeks.

Intervention

We expanded Tabasamu to adolescent girls schooling in the neighbouring communities including adolescent girls with disability.

Outcomes

During the quarter, 600 adolescent girls received sanitary towels to last them 3 months at Taboiyat Secondary School. So far in the year, 3000 adolescent girls have been beneficiaries of 3 months' supply sanitary towels.

Impact

We have availed safe supply of menstrual health and hygiene commodities to adolescent girls in schools. We have been able to combat stigma and discrimination associated with menstruation amongst adolescent girls living with disability. 3000 adolescent girls have been trained on menstrual health and hygiene, including disposal methods.

3.13 ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION AND EDUCATION

Intervention

We continue to strengthen our values in environmental conservation and education in the communities with indigenoius tree planting initiatives. This year, with every installation of a rain water harvesting system, we planted 10 indigenous trees.

Bamboo cuttings were also donated in the community with the aim of increasing bamboo for environmental conservation.

Outcomes

During the quarter, 10 indigenous trees were planted at Taboiyat Secondary school following the handing over of the Rain Water harvesting system installed at the school. Environmental Conservation education talk and tree planting demo was carried out.

So far in the year, we planted 100 indigenous trees in 9 schools. In the community, following the president's directive, we donated and planted 200 indigenous trees in various parts of the County.

Impact

As a realisation of our commitment to the tree planting initiatives, environmental conservation has been taken up in schools. We have over 90% success rate in growth of trees planted.
